Nottingham Trent University Experience

The past winter into the summer semester I attended the dual degree program, coming from National Sun-Yet Sen University, and going to Nottingham Trent University in Nottingham. It has a wonderful campus located in the center part of the city near the downtown area. 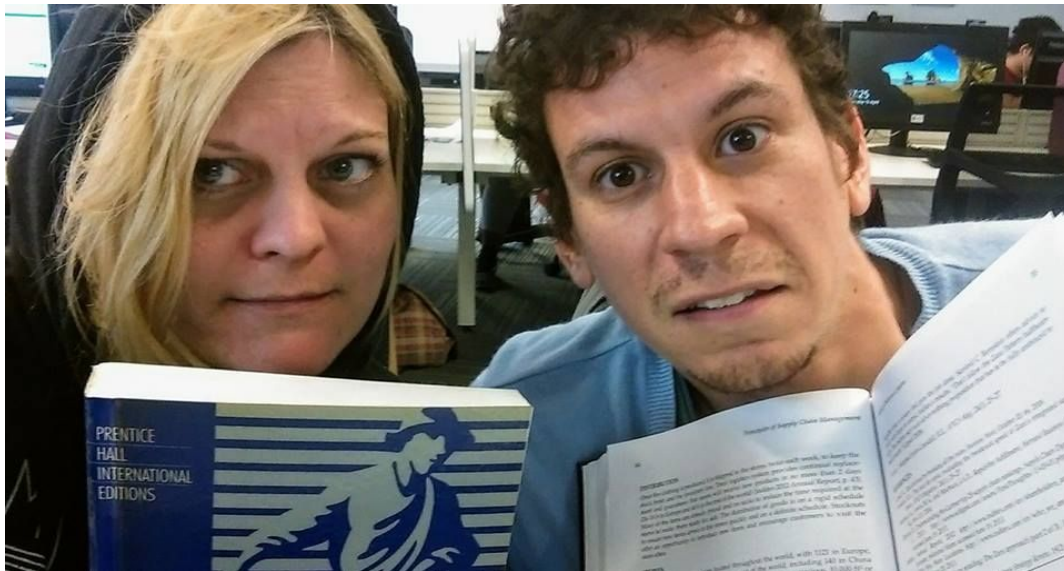

1. Introduction of NTU

I had a wonderful time studying at NTU. They had a very comprehensive orientation week which answered many of the questions that were unanswered before we arrived. The first few days were full of errands to set-up our lives in Nottingham. We collected our BMI ID card at the post office, bought SIM cards, applied for student rail passes and national insurance numbers (necessary to work in the UK) and bought all the things we needed for our house, and had a chance to explore Nottingham in the process. My favorite day of orientation was the explore Nottingham task, where we were split into groups to do a scavenger hunt around the city. The culmination of our orientation was at a leadership camp in the Peak district, where we spent two days and one night. This was an excellent opportunity to get to know all the students in our program on a personal level.

2. Learning Experience

I am enamoured of the teaching program at NTU. Courses are set as modules, so you take one course for three weeks, then have one week to complete a final paper or group project. By arranging the courses in this way, it gives students the opportunity to focus on one course at a time and this enabled us to have a deeper commitment and reflection period for each course. The classes were generally small, 15-20 people, and the professors were extremely committed to the students. Lectures were topical and relevant, and we were given many opportunities to work in groups both in the classroom and out.

3. Activities/ life in UK

Life in the UK was COLD at first, which limited our ability to explore as much as we desired. However, as the weather warmed, I spent a lot of time exploring the city and going for walks in and around Nottingham. We also found some open mics to attend, as Francis is a performer and I am an active audience. There were also several comedy nights at the Student Union. We attended a football game at the Nottingham Stadium, there are usually a few games that offer deeply discounted student tickets. We visited Nottingham Castle which is right at the edge of the city and took silly photographs with Robin Hood. We went bowling several times at the derelict bowling alley (there is also a student discount available). We went ice skating at the Nottingham Ice Centre, and Francis and I also saw Ed Sheeran perform there at the end of the semester. We also spent a lot of time attending various university events, several of which were hosted by the Global Lounge, which also offers free lunch once a week.

I spent a lot of time looking for work at restaurants and bars but it was difficult to find a short-term position. Instead I worked for a temp agency and also an event staffing company, as well as doing random odd jobs like handing out flyers at the train station.

4. What did you learn from the dual degree program?

-I learned that I prefer the hands-on teaching methods of the professors at NTU. It is much easier to be engaged with professors who you know face-to-face vs. being one of many in a large lecture hall, as has been the case with all of my NSYSU courses.

-I also learned that I prefer the module system of class schedules. It allows students to more fully engage with the material and commit more attention to detail to the course topic.

-I learned a lot from my fellow students- our program was extremely diverse, we had students from all over the world and it was extremely informative to discuss our course content from a variety of perspectives.

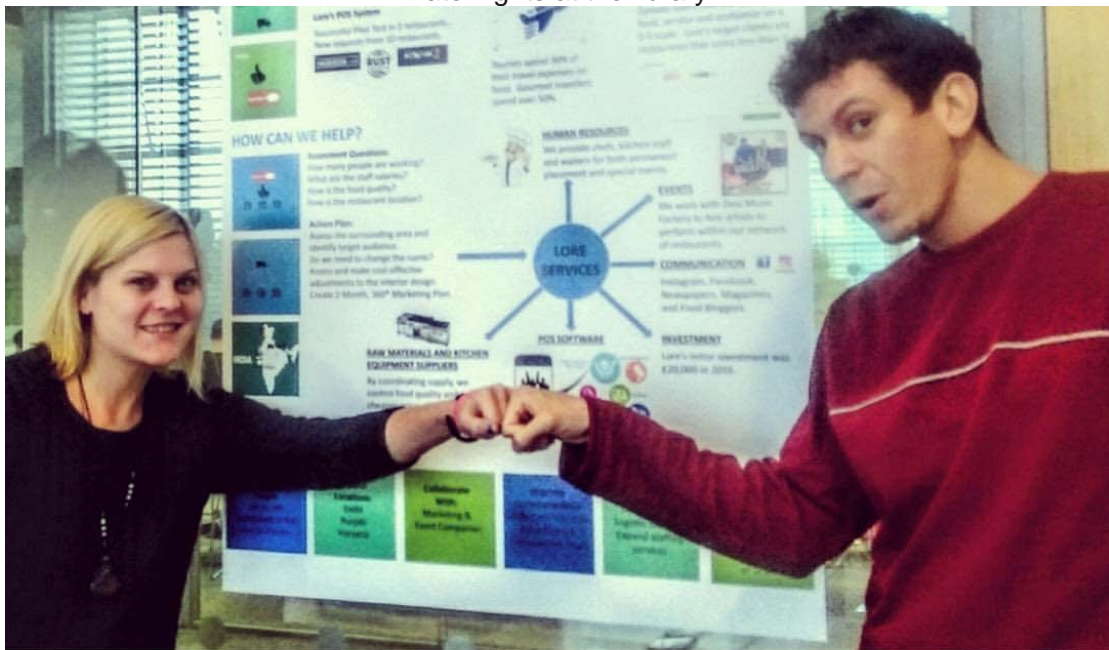
5. Feedback

My main feedback is to give students a more comprehensive understanding of the NTU Dual Degree experience and requirements before they leave for the semester. We were the first students to embark on the Dual Degree program, and we found that there were many requirements and details we did not know about before we arrived. For example, the NSYSU literature suggested that we "may have an opportunity for an internship" when in reality, we were required to complete an internship as part of the degree. This disrupted many of our plans. Students should be advised to begin looking for internships before they leave for the United Kingdom, as many positions were full by the time we arrived.

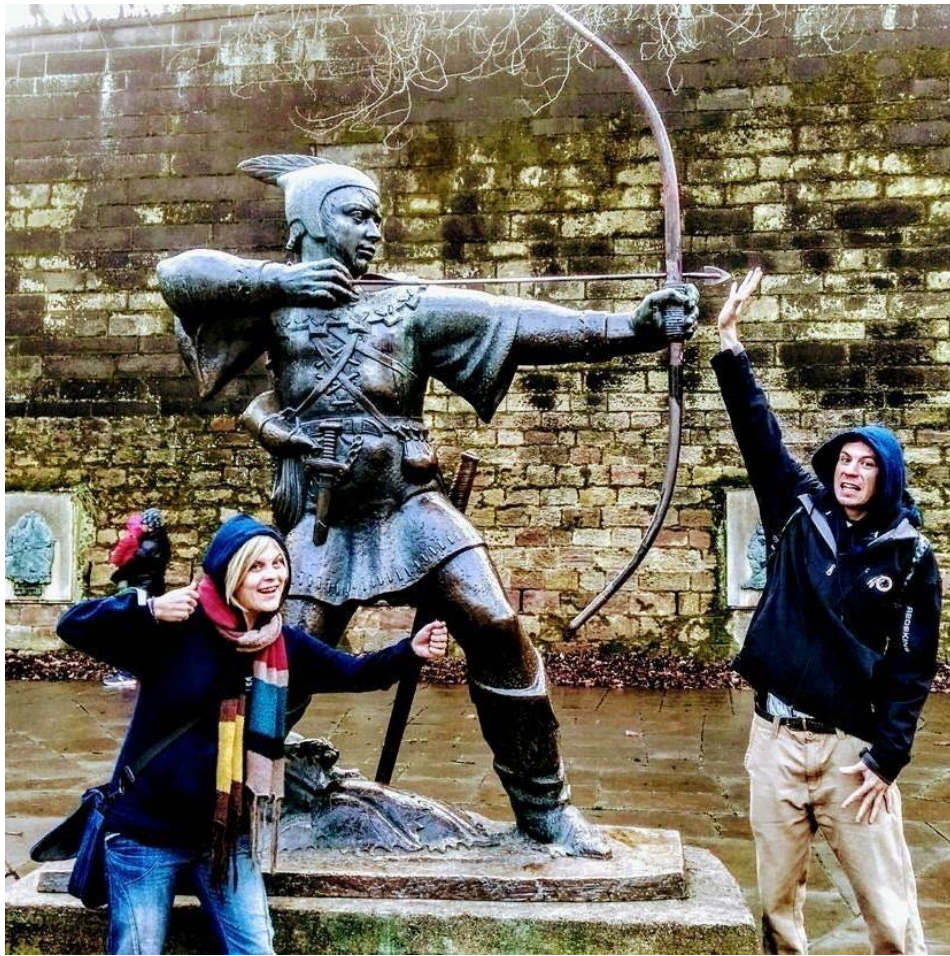
